Marin County Free Library completed another very successful year with the support of our Friends. This year the Friends continued their generous support for our summer learning/reading program. We provided a fun and educational program for 8092 Marin county kids (children and teens. They read 2,732,100 minutes! This program would simply not be possible without the F,riends' support. We also, with the help of the Library Foundation, Marin Community Foundation and the County, are providing nearly all the funding needed to purchase a new early literacy vehicle or FLAGship. The current FLAGship is 17 years old and broken down. The new vehicle will be here in late 2018.

The library was part of the Marin County Fair and gave away thousands of children's books from those we removed from the collection that were no longer needed—it was huge success!

Library staff had an entertaining and educational All Staff day—a time for us to get together and share our work experiences. It ended with an optional trip on the SMART train to Petaluma for food and drinks. The Friends provided door prizes for tickets to see some incredible authors with Bay Area events including Andy Weir, Ta-Nehisi Coates and Trevor Noah.

During the tragic North Bay fires we served the evacuation center for several days with both of our Mobile services. For that outreach activity we provided books and soccer balls! Our partner, New Media Learning at South Novato provided a virtual reality experience too in the evacuation center. It was gratifying to offer

library services to those worried about their homes, and we successfully provided some distraction to kids and adults.

As a thank you to our community the Board of Supervisors approved providing amnesty for library fines (past and present). Through January 31 late fees will be waived for all MCFL-owned late materials. Simply return your materials to any MCFL branch or book return and the fees will not be applied to your account. In some cases, people have avoided visiting the library for years because of money owed, and that's heartbreaking for us to hear. This kind of policy is used by lots of public libraries across the country, and there is trusted documentation to prove that it increases the sustained use of the library. We'd like to say thank you to the community and welcome back patrons who might have been away for a long time. We are also hoping to retrieve some long-lost materials that are no longer being published and would be useful to our collection. The existing fine schedule is 25 cents per item per day and lending services suspended after the amount reaches \$10. The temporary amnesty policy is intended to reduce barriers in the use of materials and give people a new chance to visit the library branches and use online services. Fines for youth materials were eliminated a few years ago to reduce barriers to library use.

The library is a vibrant and critical part of our community. All the work that the Friends do for the library, especially running the Book Place, is sincerely appreciated.

Library Lewes is published quarterly; the next issue will be in April. The deadline for submission of copy is March 31. News of library activities, updates, photos, ideas, and suggestions for improvement are welcome.

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Marin City News

At the Marin City Friends December 20 meeting, Floating Homes Association 2017 Houseboat Tour Directors, Larry Clinton and Flo Hoylman, presented the Friends with a \$2,610 donation, proceeds from the 2017 Annual Tour. Each year the Friends have provided 30-35 volunteers for the Tour. Joining the volunteers this year again were County Library Director Sara Jones, Corte Madera Branch Manager Julie Magnus, and Marin City Branch Manager Diana Lopez.

Branch Manager/Educational Initiatives Coordinator Diana Lopez, who started her new position October 2017, prepared a Power Point presentation for the December 20 Friends meeting highlighting how the FHA's on-going financial support was utilized during 2017. Lopez said, "Because you have supported us we have been able to

accomplish a lot of work towards bridging equity and accomplishment gaps." Her Power Point presentation highlighted continuing partnerships with the nonprofit Marin City-based Performing Stars of Marin, Marin Housing Authority (Marin Housing), Marin County Sheriff's Department and the National Park Service with programs for Marin City toddlers, K-12 students and parents.

Sara Jones reminded the attendees that the Board of Supervisors had approved a second Educational Initiatives Coordinator (the other is at the South Novato branch) because of the recent contractual partnership with the Sausalito-Marin City School District to provide oversight of school library services. Diana had been the driving force behind this educational partnership. Library staff will be embedded at Bayside-Martin Luther King Jr. Academy school library allowing access to a substantial book collection, a minimakerspace, and information and media literacy support services in the school library. Marin City Library staff members

Etienne Douglas, Becky Tuttle and Kevin Luu will also be utilized.

County Library Services Director Sara Jones, who was in attendance, announced that the Marin City Library staff had been contracted by the Sausalito–Marin City School District to provide library professional oversight and support services for the District students, and a \$10,000 grant had been awarded for early education by the State Library fund.

The Novato Library has some fascinating programs coming up. On Wednesday, January 17, 7 pm, there will be a talk on the Hamilton Wetlands Restoration Project. San Francisco Bay has lost more than 80 percent of its tidal wetlands. The Hamilton Wetlands Restoration Project represents a significant step in reversing historic habitat loss and recovering imperiled wildlife. Nursery and Field Operations Manager Christina McWhorter will discuss the development of the project, the plant and animal life in the wetlands, and the numerous opportunities for citizen science.

Disappointed in your wisteria? On Saturday, January 20, 11 am, Marin Master Gardener Rod Kerr will teach you how to do structural wisteria pruning this winter to produce a healthier vine with bountiful flowers in the spring.

The recent wildfires in the North Bay and southern California prompt us all to think about fire prevention. On Tuesday, January 30, 1–2 pm, Sandy Wargo, Fire Prevention Specialist of the Novato Fire District, will discuss how to prevent fires in the home, prepare for an emergency, and what to do in case you encounter a fire.

Is brushing up on your Spanish on your New Year's resolution list? The Spanish Conversation Club meets every Tuesday at the Novato Library from 11 to 12:30. The club is facilitated by the talented Maria Lee Goodrich, and with laughs, fiestas, and food, it's nothing like high school Spanish!

One of the highlights of the last few months was our extended hour Study Hall for high school students during Finals Week in December. Leading up to Finals, students filled the Teen Area and our Community Room, working individually, and in groups. Corte Madera Library staff members graciously agreed to adjust their schedules to cover the extra 9-11pm Study Hall. Sarah Butts, Youth Services Librarian, reports: We had over 120 high school students attend our three after-hours latenight study halls during finals week. In addition to enjoying the pizza and snacks (compliments of the Corte Madera Library Friends!), they also really appreciate the space to study late, either in groups or in the quieter parts of the building. The kids are always very polite in thanking us for doing the program, and one senior in particular mentioned how grateful he was to have a place to study since his house was "crazy full of visiting relatives." Shereen Ash, Librarian II, Adult Services, adds: After explaining about our upcoming high school study hall to a studious Redwood High student, letting him know to expect access to the entire library, free Wi-Fi, computers, printing, and pizza from 9-11 pm, he asked, "What does it cost?" He seemed surprised and pleased when I responded that it is all free.

Recent art exhibits in our Friends of the Corte Madera Library Community Room include "Holiday" by Downtown Mia Brown. In Mia's own words, she is "an artist who happens to have a disability," creating acrylic paintings with



a headwand—a brush or stylus attached to a helmet that allows the movement of her head to negotiate both shape and pressure. Mia's cerebral palsy impacts the use of her hands and she has developed over time a system that benefits her desire and dedication to create. Mia's abstract paintings are characterized by dynamic color combinations and varying textures, each alluding to the experimentation Mia allows in her process. Her paintings are informed by her interests, her life experiences, and the natural world, allowing us to access her emotions and spirit through her paintings. An exhibit of work from Pauline Ivancovich Teller will be coming up in February. Ms. Teller is a California artist who trained at Dominican University, worked with William Rauschnaubel and participated in "Art in Action: Artists Working for All the People" which included Diego Rivera. Having art in the library adds opportunities for visual learning and sharing a cultural dimension to the library experience. The Friends helped make this possible through their support of our remodel to create the exhibit space.

We are looking forward to meeting in January to see what new programs and materials we can sponsor.



favorites. Our Staff Picks section of selections assembled by our volunteers is a sure bet in many cases. People seem to enjoy the wide variety of our Picks.


